#### **Professor Craig Mahoney**



Craig Mahoney is Chief Executive of the Higher Education Academy. Prior to joining the HEA in 2010, he was Deputy Vice-Chancellor at Northumbria University. He is an outspoken advocate for internationalisation, including globalisation, professional development, staff and student exchange and international partnership development in teaching, research and enterprise. As a long-term aim, he is interested in developing the HEA's work outside the UK.

#### **Dr Janette Ryan**



Janette Ryan is Director of the Higher Education Academy's Teaching International Students Project. She is also Research Associate at the China Centre, University of Oxford, Visiting Professor, the Centre for Academic Practice and Internationalisation at Leeds Metropolitan University and adjunct lecturer in Education at Monash University. Her publications include *A guide to teaching international students* (2000), *Teaching international students: Improving learning for all* (2005), *International education and the Chinese learner* (2010), *China's higher education reform and internationalisation* (2011) and *Education reform in China* (2011). #### **Professor Elspeth Jones**



Elspeth Jones is Professor of the Internationalisation of Higher Education and International Dean at Leeds Metropolitan University, where she has been responsible for leading internationalisation across the University since 2003. With a background in applied linguistics and TEFL, Elspeth has over 25 years' experience of international education. She worked for the British Council in Japan and Singapore for seven years and was an exchange student in Germany. Her publications include the edited collection, *Internationalisation and the Student Voice* (Routledge 2010) and *Internationalising Higher Education* (edited with Sally Brown) (Routledge 2007). In her role as International Dean, Elspeth wrote the internationalisation strategy for Leeds Metropolitan University and it has been her job to lead its implementation, with responsibility for the recruitment of international students, for curriculum internationalisation and staff development for internationalisation as well as

the university's international partnerships. In 2009 she founded CAPRI, the Centre for Academic Practice and Research in Internationalisation, at Leeds Metropolitan University. [Slides](#)

### **Professor Christine Ennew**



Christine Ennew is Pro Vice Chancellor at the University of Nottingham where she has responsibility for Internationalisation and the Faculty of Science. She was Academic Director of the Division of Business and Management at the University of Nottingham in Malaysia during its start-up phase (2000-01), and the Director of the Christel DeHaan Tourism and Travel Research Institute.

Today she manages the University's ambitious international strategy, which has attracted students and academic staff from almost 150 nations to research and teaching campuses in both Britain and Asia. She has management board responsibility for the development and integration of Nottingham's historic campuses within China and in Malaysia, and for the work of the University's International Office in the UK. Christine Humfrey is Special Professor of International Higher Education, University of Nottingham, Visiting Fellow Edge Hill University and Management Consultant in International Higher Education. She was the founding Director of the International Office at Nottingham and has researched, published, taught and advised on internationalisation, international marketing and the development of the university sector in the UK. Since retirement

she has undertaken consultancies for Universities UK, the British Council, UKCISA, the Danish Government, and a number of institutions in the higher and further education sector. She is a Teaching Champion for the Teaching International Students Project and a Visiting Fellow to the Centre for Academic Practice and Research in Internationalisation of Higher Education, Leeds Metropolitan University. Sue's current research interests focus on the internationalization of higher education and its implications for innovative teaching and learning methods, curriculum development, staff development and student support. She currently teaches on postgraduate professional development programmes in Education and supervises research into innovative learning and teaching and the internationalization of higher education.
